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Jean Miller Schmidt Elected to Faculty

Dr. Jean Miller Schmidt, Leonia, New Jersey, has been elected to the Faculty of The Iliff School of Theology.

Dr. Schmidt will be Assistant Professor of Modern Church History at the graduate theological school, effective June 1, 1975, it was announced by Dr. Jameson Jones, Iliff President.

A native of Teaneck, New Jersey, Dr. Schmidt is a summa cum laude graduate of Drew University, and has Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from the University of Chicago. She studied a year at Oxford University, England.

She was awarded a Kent Fellowship by the Danforth Foundation, a Rockefeller Doctoral Fellowship in Religion, and a University of Chicago Divinity School Fellowship.

From 1969 to 1974 she taught in the Department of Religion of Southern Methodist University.

Dr. Schmidt was elected Vice President of the American Academy of Religion's Southwestern Region, and then President. She is a member, also, of the Society for Religion in Higher Education, the American Society of Church History, and the American Historical Association.

She is married to Stephen Schmidt. They and two children will move to Denver during the summer.

Professor Van Sickle Dies After Sudden Illness

Professor Harold Gordon Van Sickle, a member of the Iliff faculty since September 1, 1952, died on March 17, of the result of a stroke suffered on March 10.

He was the first full time member of the Iliff faculty to die in active service since the death of Professor Albert Behner in 1928.

Memorial services were held at First United Methodist Church of Littleton on March 20, conducted by Iliff President Jameson Jones. Memorial tributes were paid by The Reverend Russel Rehm, Professor Van Sickle's student assistant, and Professor Harvey H. Potthoff

Mr. Rehm noted how Professor Van Sickle "loved his work, and we, his students, loved him in return, for he was an excellent teacher . . . Leaping back through history with Professor Van Sickle to relive exciting events was a great adventure! He knew how to make it come alive."

Mr. Rehm continued: "He gave great lectures! It was a joy to sit through them. He introduced us to real people,

saints and sinners, and many a bubble was punctured under the pinprick of his wit. I loved to watch his mannerisms — that well-timed pause, that tilted eyebrow, and those funny favorite expressions. He had this one characteristic look that put the capital "T" on truth in an unforgettable fashion. He lectured honestly; he lived honestly. We students respected him because he was our friend."

Dr. Potthoff spoke of Professor Van Sickle as a Christian scholar who found joy and fulfillment in his calling, and as "a great human being—large in outlook, warm, resilient in spirit, with a wonderful sense of humor that brightened many a committee and faculty meeting."

Dr. Potthoff continued, "He was a great teacher. Possessing a remarkable memory he lectured with a minimum of notes, linking history with the living present, revealing the human side of the persons he was talking about, helping students toward that wisdom which comes only by way of an historical perspective."

Dr. Potthoff spoke of how those on the Iliff faculty held Professor Van Sickle in such high regard, respecting his scholarship, knowing him as a warm and cooperative co-worker who brought dignity and deep dedication to his position. "Gordon Van Sickle was a churchman, deeply committed to what the church at its best represents, but quick to call to account when the church failed to measure up to its calling. His interest in the ecumenical movement and in the world mission of the church bore witness to his vision. To know him and to study with him was to see church, ministry, and mission in a larger way."

Typical of many tributes is that of David F. Woodyard, an Iliff student currently on a full time internship at First United Methodist Church in Seattle, who wrote: "Professor Van Sickle's contribution to both the academic and 'human' dimensions of life at Iliff will be evident even in his physical absence. He truly had a unique talent for wit, humor and

Mrs. Gayle Morris Beam died March 19 in San Diego. Her husband, Dr. Harry Morris, was president of Iliff from June 15, 1942 until his death on February 14, 1946. She is now survived by Dr. Russell Beam of San Diego and two daughters.

George E. Pennell (BD '20, ThM '23, ThD '31) died in Clarinda, Iowa on April 3. He served churches in Illinois, Colorado, Wyoming, New Mexico, Kansas, Missouri, and Nebraska for forty years. He was the author of "J Document" and contributed to several periodicals and vo'umes of sermons. He was 90 years old.

Leroy G. Snyder (BD '22) died October 25 at Newton, Kansas.

Dennis Tenney (BD '29) was appointed by Governor John D. Vanderhoof as Honorary Poet Laureate for the State of Colorado. The book is written for the person whose professional or work responsibilities calls for him or her to lead a small group, but whose professonal or job training doen't provide specific skills of this nature. Albert F. Frahm, Long-Time Trustee, Dies in Kansas

Albert F. Frahm, a resident of Colby, Kansas, and a member of the Board of Trustees of Iliff for more than 15 years, died December 31.

Mr. Frahm had a deep interest in education. In addition to serving on the Board of Trustees of Iliff, he was a leader in his community in helping to establish Colby Community College and served as chairman of its Board of Trustees. He also served on the Board of the Pioneer Library, and helped to promote a great number of other community projects. As a life-long resident of Colby, he won the respect and admiration of all who knew him.

A variety of events have commemorated his life and honored his memory. The latest is an April 3 Albert F. Frahm Memorial Concert sponsored in Colby by Western Plains Art Council.

The activities of The United Methodist Church at Colby were a part of his life and thought. He gave considerable leadership to the church and supported it generously with his time, abilities and resources.

The Memorial Service was held at The United Methodist Church at Colby on January 2. The Reverend Marshall Stanton and The Reverend Donald Blanton (M.Div. '68) conducted the service. In addition to his wife, Helen, Mr. Frahm is survived by a daughter, Sharon, of Colby, three sons, Ronald of Colby, Kenneth of Wichita, and Bruce of the home; and eight grand-children.

'storytelling' that really brought church history alive for many. I for one am glad to be able to say that Professor Van Sickle had a part in my seminary experience."

Harold Gordon Van Sickle was born in Pondcreek, Oklahoma, September 26, 1910, the son of Roy Scott Van Sickle and Ethelyn Violet White Van Sickle. He was educated at Lon Morris Junior College, Southwestern University, Yale University Divinity School, and the Graduate School of the University of Texas.

He was ordained a minister of The Methodist Church in 1940. He served five years as a pastor in Texas. He then began a distinguished teaching career, including faculty appointments at Tulane University, the University of Texas, and the University of Denver. At the time of his death, he was Professor of Christian History and Missions at Iliff.

He served as a Navy Chaplain in the Pacific Theater, World War II. He was a member of the Southwest Texas Conference, The United Methodist Church. He was active in civic and community affairs, and a member of numerous professional associations and societies. He traveled extensively speaking, lecturing, and conferring with national leaders and missions leaders around the world.

He married Iva Loretta Henly, who survives him, on June 8, 1937. Other survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Iras Crymble of Carbondale, Colorado; Mrs. Janet Kalinski, Boulder, Colorado; his mother, four brothers, an aunt, two cousins, two grandchildren, several nieces and nephews.

It was his request that any memorial contributions be made to The Iliff School of Theology to provide scholarships for students. The Harold Gordon Van Sickle Memorial Scholarship Fund has been established and will be continued in his memory.
