Dr. and Mrs. Williams Are Honored By Iliff Community

In honor of 30 years of teaching at Iliff and in anticipation of his retirement a year from now, Dr. Walter G. Williams and his wife, Mary, are being honored by students, alumni and other friends of Iliff.

Dr. Williams will be on sabbatical leave in 1972-73. He and Mrs. Williams will be at Soochow University in Taiwan where he will teach Bible.

In recent months, students began a campaign to honor Dr. Williams on the 30th anniversary of his teaching at Iliff. The campaign was student initiated and was well underway before Dr. and Mrs. Williams knew anything about it. The students have been gathering contributions and are still receiving cash gifts in honor of Dr. and Mrs. Williams.

The money will be used for a set of projects. One is to strengthen the archaeological display, with particular emphasis on the Dead Sea Scrolls. The students have already purchased photographic copies in color of parts of the Isaiah Scroll, a section of the Habakkuk Commentary, a portion of the Book of Discipline, and a set of slides from John Trevor's collection. Iliff will then have on campus the best of reproductions which are available, and a complete microfilm copy of the materials found in Cave I at Qumran. The students also plan to purchase some of the more expensive books in the field of Biblical archaeology.

The students are making arrangements for increasing display space for purchased materials and adding one further resource. If they and Dr. Williams can find adequate technical resources, Dr. Williams will put together scripts and a collection of slides so that a filmstrip or filmstrips could be made for use by alumni, church groups, and others. Norman Naff and Phil Wood have been the student leaders of the project. Funds may still be given, with checks payable to Iliff and clearly designated for the Williams' Fund. Dr. Williams was the commencement speaker at the 1972 commencement, using as his theme, "And Now to Begin."

Iliff Students Receive National Church Awards

Two Iliff women will receive grants from national United Methodist funds. The funds were set up by the Women's Division of the United Methodist Board of Missions to help augment the number of women serving in ministry and theology. Some 30 grants have just been announced, bringing to 56 the number of women aided by the funds since they were started in 1970.

Mrs. Helen Bayne, who has just finished her second year at Iliff, has been named the recipient of a grant from the Laskey Fund. The fund honors its 1964-68 president, Mrs. Glen E. Laskey of Ruston, Louisiana. Mrs. Bain is a graduate of Southern Oregon College at Ashland, plans to be ordained, and hopes to serve in the parish ministry. She anticipates graduating from Iliff in June of 1973.

Miss Carol Jean Voisin, an M.Div. graduate of last month, receives a grant from the Johnson Fund, which honors Miss Lillian A. Johnson of Albany, New York, who retired in 1970 after 20 years' service as a Women's Division executive working with employed women. Miss Voisin is a graduate of Colorado State Univer-

Dr. Chester Pennington Elected Professor of Preaching and Worship

Dr. Chester A. Pennington, since 1955 senior minister of the Hennepin Avenue United Methodist Church in Minneapolis, has been elected Professor of Preaching and Worship at Iliff. He will begin teaching at Iliff with the fall quarter of 1972.

With this election, every post on the faculty is filled and no vacancies are anticipated for the coming year. One professor, Dr. Walter G. Williams, will be on sabbatical leave.

Dr. Pennington brings to the faculty a national stature, a clear image as a pastor and a strong reputation as a skilled preacher.

He holds a B.A. degree from Temple University, a B.D. from Drew, a Ph.D. from Drew, L.H.D. from Ohio Northern University, and a D.D. from McKendree College. He has also studied at Oxford University in England and the Ecumenical Institute in Bossey, Switzerland.

He began his ministry in New Jersey, his native state. He served pastorates there and also taught philosophy at Centenary College. He was a pastor in New York City before going to Minneapolis. He has received numerous civic honors in Minneapolis and has held significant positions in church and community life.

His published books include Even So...Believe (Abingdon Press, 1966), With Good Reason (Abingdon Press, 1967), Half Truths or Whole Gospel? (Abingdon Press, 1972), and After the Children Leave Home, a curriculum study unit of the United Methodist Board of Education to be published this fall.

Everett W. Palmer Fellowship in Preaching for 1972-73.

Fellowships in Preaching are given by the Department of the Ministry of the United Methodist Church, their purpose to enhance the ministry of the Church through emphasis on excellence in preaching. Five

fellowships are given in a year, but only one is named in honor of the late Bishop Everett W. Palmer. The Fellowship is to be utilized in a year of study in preaching as a resident student in one of the United Methodist theological schools. Mr. Heetland will study at Iliff.

The Reverend Richard W. McNally, Elizabeth Iliff Warren Fellow and M.Div. graduate of Iliff in 1971, has



been awarded a Dempster Fellowship by the United Methodist Church.

Normally five fellowships are given each year to out-standing graduates of United Methodist Schools who are in the midst of doctoral studies, their expectation being to teach. This is the second consecutive

year that an Iliff graduate has received a Dempster award.

Mr. McNally is now serving as pastor of Community United Methodist Church in Rockville, Connecticut and studying at the Hartford Seminary Foundation

Next year he will complete a Qur'anic project on intercession which was begun this summer under a grant from Hartford. Along with advanced work in Arabic, he will begin the translation of some hitherto untranslated works, probably those of Ibn Salah or of a 16th century commentary and the Hadith. Next year, after the completion of his residency requirements, he will submit his manuscript holdings of one or more Arab countries in conjunction with his thesis.

Bishop and Mrs. Donald Harvey Tippett (BD '24) celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary on June 16 with the renewal of their vows at Epworth United Methodist Church in Berkeley, California. Bishop Charles F. Golden officiated. Their sons, Donald Mead Tippett and Philip Auman Tippett prepared a celebration in honor of their distinguished parents.

Dr. Oliver Read Whitley, Professor of Sociology of Religion, will give the M. T. Burt Lectures at the Nebraska School of Religion, in cooperation with the Departments of History and Romance Languages of the College of Arts and Sciences of the University of Nebraska in Lincoln, next November.

Dr. Charles S. Milligan (ThM '42; ThD '52), Professor of Philosophy of Religion, was recipient of the Communications and Leadership Award of Toastmasters International this spring. He was named to the Denver Post Gallery of Fame "for aiding and furthering both oral and written communication beyond the nor-mal call of duty." Dr. Milligan is moderator of KRMA-TV's Open Topic program each week.

Professor H. G. Van Sickle, Christian History and Missions, was the preacher for the 113th Anniversary Service and Pilgrimage of the Colorado Methodist Historical Society at St. James Church in Central City on July 9. St. James is the oldest protestant church organization and the oldest church building extant in Colorado. Phil D. Brownlee, Iliff MDiv student, is now the minister at St. James. Mr. and Mrs. Van Sickle have a cottage in the historic community.

One of the nationally known trustees of The Iliff School of Theology is the Honorable William Donald

Brewer, a Commissioner of the Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D.C.

Mr. Brewer was elected a trustee in 1969.

Commissioner Brewer was born in Kentucky. He attended the University of Southern California, and is a graduate of the

American Management Association, and has taken special courses in criminal law in connection with his duties as a Post Office Inspector. He is a veteran of 29 years of service with the Post Office Department. From 1955 to 1961, he was Regional Director of the Post Office Department's Denver office, heading the Denver region. From 1963 to 1968, he was president and chief executive officer of the O.K. Tire and Rubber Company of Littleton. In 1969, he was Federal Co-chairman of the Four Corners Regional Commission, an agency created to carry out long-range programs to stimulate economic growth in a 92-county area of Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico and Utah. He was Deputy Administrator of the Small Business Administration, before being appointed by President Nixon to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Commissioner Brewer is lay leader, trustee, and a member of the Administrative Board of Trinity United Methodist Church in Denver. He took his oath of office with the Interstate Commerce Commission on July 23, 1970 and has a seven year term. He and Mrs. Brewer have a home in McLean, Virginia, and also maintain a residence in Denver. They have one son, William D. Brewer, Jr., who lives in Denver.

1958. She is a graduate of the University of Denver with A.B. and M.S. degrees and has a Ph.D. in Biochemistry from the University of Colorado, For a number of years she was a Research Fellow with the Child Research Council of Denver, and later was Assistant Professor in Child Development at the University of Colorado School of Medicine. Some of the results of her research in basal metabolism were published in such journals as Journal of Nutrition, Journal of Pediatrics, and Journal of Experimental Biology and Medicine. She holds membership in such professional societies as Sigma Xi, Fellow of AAAS, Coloado - Wyoming Academy of Science, Society of Experimental Biology and Medicine.

In 1959 she married Dr. Robert C. Shattuck, otolaryngologist, in the Chapel of The Iliff School of Theology with Dr. Lowell Swan, then president of Iliff, officiating. She was a member of the University Park United Methodist Church, then Warren United Methodist Church, and then confirmed in the Episcopal Church in 1964 in order to join the church of her husband and sons. She is now a communicant of the Episcopal Church of the Transfiguration in Evergreen and serves on the Altar Guild there.
