

# **ILIFF'S SEVENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY**

The Iliff School of Theology began its celebration of the seventy-fifth anniversary of its founding with the June Commencement.

Dr. William H. Bernhardt, Professor and Academic Dean Emeritus, gave the Commencement Address. Speaking on the theme, "The Iliff Heritage and Your Future", he linked the past and its contributions to the present graduate

Twenty-five students were graduated during the exercises. Twentyone received the Bachelor of Divinity degree; the Master of Religious Education Degree was awarded to one: one received the Master of Sacred Theology; and two were awarded the Doctor of Theology Degree.

Mr. Ralph B. Mayo, President of the Board of Trustees, gave a very fitting tribute to the late Miss Louise lliff.

The Charge to the students was given by Bishop R. Marvin Stuart, presiding Bishop of the Denver Area and Trustee of the School.

The next day, the Board of Trus-

tees held their annual meeting. Beginning with a luncheon meeting at noon for the Anniversary Committee, (Mr. R. S. Doenges, Chairman), a visit followed to the home of the late Miss Louise Iliff to inspect this gift to the School through her Will.

The annual meeting also contained a brief, but most fitting, Memorial Service which was presented by the trustees—The Reverend Richard E. Halbert, The Reverend Ben H. Christner, The Reverend Rufus C. Baker; Mr. S. Arthur Henry and President Mayo.

At the meeting various items of business were discussed, including the finishing of the second floor of the Ira J. Taylor Library, the completion of the renovation of Iliff Hall, and a tentative program for the anniversary year.

It was announced at the meeting that Iliff was the residuary legatee of the Will of Miss Louise Iliff. She who had been most generous through her lifetime now was remembering the School with a large bequest.

Dr. Bernhardt also addressed the dinner meeting which followed for the Trustees and their wives or husbands. He pointed out the future path which theological education must take in order to be relevant to needs of the world and of the Church.

Dr. Bernhardt before his retirement had served Iliff as one of its ablest professors for nearly one-half of its history. Several times he was called upon to be its interim president and during his last years, he served as academic dean of the School. He certainly was the one to help start the celebration of Iliff's year of observance and its dedication to the task of theological education.

# Miss Louise Iliff Passes Away In Her Ninety-first Year

Miss Louise Iliff, one of the four founders of The Iliff School of Theology, passed away at her home, Fitzroy Place, on Thursday, April 21, 1966. She suffered a broken hip on Easter Sunday, 1965, but had sufficiently recovered to walk with a crutch and often with a cane. However, other complications began to appear and she slowly lost her strength and was bedfast for several months before her death. Though nearly blind and very hard of hearing, she kept her other faculties almost until the hour of her passing.


Born in Denver, August 15, 1875, of John Wesley and Elizabeth Fraser Iliff, she had lived her entire life here. Graduated from the University of Denver in 1915 with the degree, A.B., she had travelled with her mother and her stepfather, Bishop Henry White Warren, around the world several times.

When The Iliff School of Theology was founded in 1892 and her stepbrother, William S. Iliff, gave the first building, she, with her mother, provided the beautiful Chapel and she herself gave the Chancel and its furnishings. It was her special interest to see that the Chapel was always refurbished and made the lovely place it has always been for worship and meditation.

She had been a member of Trinity Methodist Church, later of Grace Methodist Church, and in 1913 when Capitol Hill Church was merged with the Warren Chapel to become Warren Memorial Methodist Church, she transferred her membership there. In addition, she was vitally interested in the University Park Methodist Church and gave generously to several building programs.

However, she always said that her first and dearest interest was in the School she helped to found. She served as trustee from 1913 to her death. She was a member of the Executive Committee and was Auditor of the School during many years. She was also a member of many of its important committees and always was ready to serve in varied capacities.

She knew the faculty over the years and often entertained them in her home. The staff, the student body, (Continued on page 2)

# A Tribute To LOUISE ILIFF Trustees Memorial Service

#### June 10, 1966

Great institutions do not just happen. We have them because someone cared. Cared enough to devote themselves to its establishment.

It has been my deep personal privilege to have worked closely and intimately with Louise Iliff in her active, intense and devoted attention to the operation of The Iliff School of Theology and, also, in her personal affairs. It has been a rich and rewarding experience. She was truly a great woman. Throughout her long life she gave generously of her time, thought. effort and leadership to Iliff School. She was a trustee for 63 years and served as an officer and as a member of every committee at some time during that long history. She helped her family to build this Iliff Hall in 1892 and gave generously during almost every year since. She helped in every special project and was an inspiration to us all in every campaign, of which there have been many.

She always stood for the highest and best as we made plans for the future. Also, she was exacting in reassuring accurate reports on progress. It was good discipline for all of us, especially officers, faculty and staff. Louise Iliff has made the greatest contribution in our history to the development of Iliff School to its present high standing in the field of theological education and by the provisions of her Will to its future growth and quality attainments. What she has done during her lifetime for the good of others will bless humanity for generations to come. We thank God for people who care and for Louise Iliff.

A memorial tribute to Miss Louise Iliff was presented to the Association of Methodist Theological Schools at their May meeting:

Miss Louise Iliff died on April 21, 1966, in her ninety-first year. She had been a co-founder of The Iliff School of Theology in 1892, and a member of the Board of Trustee since its incorporation as a separate institution in 1902. Her vital interest in The Iliff School was reflected in her years as Auditor and her work on every committee of the Board during these more than seventy years. She had lived for the school and knew intimately the faculty, the staff, and the student body over the years. While we are grateful for her release from great pain and suffering, yet Iliff and Methodism has lost an exemplary patroness of theological education in the giving of her time, talents, and possessions. We would give thanks to God for her spirit and her life which was fully devoted to the training of the ministry.

Louise Iliff was the last survivor of the Iliff family group whose interest and generous financial support enabled the construction and furnishing of Iliff Hall and its opening in September of 1892.

She served continuously as a member of the Board of Trustees from its inception. Until prevented by illness in recent years, she participated in every area of the School's activities. She served as auditor of the School and, over the years, participated as a member of almost all of the important committees, including the Executive Committee.

Until her death at Denver, Colorado, on April 21, 1966, in her ninety-first year, her interest and concern for the welfare of the School, its faculty and its students never wavered.

As in her lifetime she generously supported the School in its financial needs, so in death did she remember the School she helped to found and loved so dearly; and through her generousity the School will receive by far the largest single gift in its entire history.

NOW, THEREFORE, WE, THE TRUSTEES OF THE ILIFF SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY assembled here in our annual meeting, do hereby express unanimously our appreciation for the life and works of Louise Iliff which are so closely interwoven with the very fabric of this School.


